

The first-ever Limbo Challenge is history and it was a great success! We had low-gravity beers from all over the Metroplex as well as elsewhere inside and outside of Texas. Thanks to all who entered! Judging took place at Bruce Fabijonas' house over a weekend, with the Best of Show and Lawnmower judging taking place on Monday. Everything went very smoothly thanks to the efforts of many! We expect this competition to grow significantly next year as we are planning on it becoming part of the Lone Star Circuit. Extra help with check-in, stewarding, and judging will certainly be needed.

The awards ceremony was held at Big Buck Brewery and Steakhouse on Saturday night, August 26th. Folks showed up for dinner and a couple of brews before migrating to the awards area. There, the hopeful competitors were greeted to a real treat. Big Buck head brewer Raymond Plasek provided two kegs of his own session beers: a honey rye and a Kölsch. Big Buck were great hosts and Raymond had some wonderful beers on tap. NTHBA is already looking forward to the 2nd annual Limbo Challenge!

www.nthba.org. Raise a glass for the Best of Show winner -NTHBA's own Jim Layton for his Kölsch! Jim was the man to beat, as he won five medals in addition to the BOS award. NTHBA cleaned up on our home field with five first, five second, and four third place medals. Participation from outside was good too, with the Knights of the Brown Bottle, Foam Rangers, and Beer Mafia all winning medals including at least one first place award. Ed Vandergrift of Beer Mafia deserves special mention as he was the only brewer to win first place medals in multiple categories: European amber lager with a Vienna Lager and English brown ale with a northern brown.



We also had a great showing from some of our newer club members. Damon Lewis, who moved here from the Lubbock area and joined the club earlier in the year, took both 1st and 2nd in the Scottish ales category with a 60 and 70 shilling Scottish ales. Steve Sauerwein, who joined the club very recently, not only took 1st place in the fruit beer/spice-herb-vegetable beer category, but placed third in Best of Show. His winning beer was a chili beer featuring roasted poblano and Anaheim peppers. This is a great sign for our club. We really need new members, as well as older members that are new to competition to step up to the plate and compete!

Brewdays By Fred David





The Cactus Challenge is the next competition in the Lone Star Circuit. The entry deadline has passed, and the event will be held Friday on Saturand



The American Homebrewers Association recently released the schedule for the first three club-only competitions for 2007. Until they release the specific deadlines for national entries, we can't say for certain which month we'll hold our competitions so consider these tentative. However, this should help you plan your brewing schedule:

- o Low Gravity/Session Beers (O.G. <0.045 Can you say Limbo?) January 2007
- o Scottish Ales (Category 9A, B, and C) February or March 2007
- o Extract Beers (Extract >50% of fermentables Categories 1-23) April 2007

John's family are also like that. John leaves behind a loving wife Judy, who is also so nice. Whenever I visited


