

In 1998, more than 400 judges evaluated 3,489 homebrewed beverages. AHA expects approximately 4,000 entries for the 1999 Competition.

First-round entries must be received at the appropriate site between Monday, March 29 and 5 p.m. on Friday, April 9, 1999. Second-round entries must be received at the appropriate site between Monday, June 14, and 5 p.m. on Friday, June 18, 1999. Notification will be mailed by May 21 with additional instructions if your entry advances to the second round.

Everything's better with Bluebonnet on it

Texas comes from the Indian word "tejas" which means friends. Well friends you sure know how to throw a party!

There aren't many competitions that have as much to offer as the Bluebonnet Brew Off. On Friday when you check in you receive your name badge and Tshirts, mugs etc. There must be more than forty people in line so you know that there is more to it than that. Well, there are two kegs of beer for the thirsty. (I hate waiting without beer) but more important...the annual jockey for a bus seat on the pubcrawl. This is no easy task! The route must be scrutinized, food & beer quality (I've got that reversed haven't I?) This is best researched by asking the locals while drinking beer in line. There are four busses all on different routes so the proper questions are important. I remember one year I waited (researched) about 20 minuets in line. The hands down favorite bus route was

"bus 2", everyone said "bus 2" was the way to go. I asked no further questions, no further research was required. Upon reaching the table I found that they had named all the busses "bus2". I stood there sweating watching the seats fill up wondering if Lewis Carrol had ever been to Texas. To this day the busses are still "bus 2" but they designate them by color so be sure to ask for a color, unless of course your color-blind, then your s.o.l. And yes, there are other pitfalls when picking a bus, be sure to look on roster for fellow homebrewers who have a marked propensity for flatulence. Myself and a busload of other crawlies were stranded one year by a bus driver who thought something had gone foul with the bus...he was part right.

Friday night starts the dinner. Three courses served with the guest speakers being introduced and asked to say a few words, and of course good beer. After dinner this venue becomes the Charlie Gottenkieny show. Charlie, well known for his knowledge of Belgian beers is a national ribbon holder in the style. He has a passion for going to Belgium and hunting Lambic. He brings his bounty back and shares it with us on Friday night once a year. This is nothing less than heroic, you'd agree if you had been there. I lost count of how many we tasted and had never heard of many. He did have some bad news. He reported that lambic having difficulty maintaining its tradition and true lambic is a vanishing style. I think I saw a tear there. On the brighter side then the lambic was gone we still had lots of beer to drink. In fact they kept bringing more out. The room was rearranged so that there were several tables, behind which a brewery rep. would dispense his product. Several local and national micros were represented. I stayed at the Rouge table, it was a stout night for me. When things broke up I discovered the reason we had three

My nerves were a little on edge with the CFHB having the most entries in the competition, 150. There was a possibility that the Bluebonnet title may go to my our club for the first time ever. Five hours of drinking beer was just the thing to calm my nerves. Living in Central Florida its possible that you would not be use to having the choice of beer as wide as you see on this pub crawl. I've been to a lot of beer bars but it still puts me off balance when you walk into a pub and find over a hundred feet of back bar with taps jammed in every couple of inches. Choice can be refreshing yet confusing at the same time. By the third stop things on the bus had started to degradate.
