For the brewers schedule, it won't be long before the club Christmas Party. This year we will hold the 2nd Annual Holiday Brew Contest (keg competition) so you need to be planning your

entry recipe. If you don't have a keg to put your brew in, contact Bo Turton. He will provide a "loaner keg" and instructions for club members that haven't tried keging yet. Last year we had 19 entries. Everyone at the party tried them and cast a "People's Choice" ballot for their favorite. All entrants received a Custom Made Tap Handle. We'll do it again this year so start planning. The 1st place winner will receive a \$50 gift certificate for brewing ingredients at Homebrew Headquarters.

The Bluebonnet Brew-Off committee has chosen the theme "Open Styles" for the 2002 competition. They are now accepting artwork entries for posters and glasses. If you would like to submit your artwork, please bring it to our club meeting on October 9th. Also be thinking about what beer style our club should brew and

promote in our room crawl suite.

Next years AHA National Homebrew Conference will be in June 2002. A local planning committee is forming and needs volunteers from all area homebrew clubs. If you are interested in taking part in preparing for this special event, see me at our club meeting or email me at steve4beer@aol.com.

Brewer Royale

This month we'll be judging California Common Beer. Bring in your entries for judging, and good luck to all.

6C. California Common Beer

Aroma: May have a pronounced woody or rustic hop aroma (as from Northern Brewer, for example). Restrained fruitiness. May have a moderate toasted malt aroma. Diacetyl low to none.

Appearance: Dark gold to copper to medium amber.

Flavor: Malty, balanced with a pronounced hop bitterness. Rustic/woody (e.g., Northern Brewer) hop flavor medium to none. May have a toasted (not roasted) malt flavor. Balance is generally about even between malt and hops. Diacetyl low to none.

Mouthfeel: Medium-bodied. Medium to medium-high carbonation.

Overall Impression: A beer with solid malt and hop expression, only mildly fruity and having woody/rustic hop character.

History: American West Coast original. Large shallow fermenters are used. Originally, in the absence of handy ice or refrigeration, the locally cool ambient temperatures of the San Francisco peninsula led to a beer that was fermented with lager yeast, but at temperatures that were at the cool end of the ale temperature range.

Comments: Similar to American pale ale, although typically less fruity. Hop flavor/aroma is woody rather than citrusy, although a slightly citrusy character has been noted by some in a commercial example back in the mid-1980s.

Ingredients: Pale ale malt, American hops (usually woody, such as Northern Brewer, rather than citrusy), small amounts of toasted malt and/or light caramel/crystal malts. Lager yeast, however some strains (often with the mention of "California" in the name) work better than others at the warmer fermentation temperatures (55 to 60oF) used (some German strains produce excessive sulfury character). Water should have relatively low sulfate and low to moderate carbonate levels.

Vital Statistics: OG: 1.044-1.055

IBUs: 35-45 FG: 1.011-1.014

SRM: 8-14 ABV: 4-5.5%

Commercial Examples: Anchor Steam, Old Dominion Victory Amber.

Get your entries ready before then.

Elections for the NTHBA officers will be held at the November club meeting at the Ginger Man (tentatively). In next month's newsletter, there will be a ballot for you to cast your votes. If you'd like to run for office, please send an email to djtrotter@yahoo.com by September 30 to tell us, and include your brewing history. This is a chance for your voice to be really heard. As an officer, you'll be able to help steer the club on activities and meetings. The winners of the election (held in November) will be announced at the December club meeting and Christmas party.

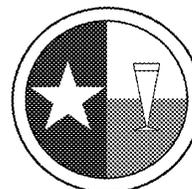
